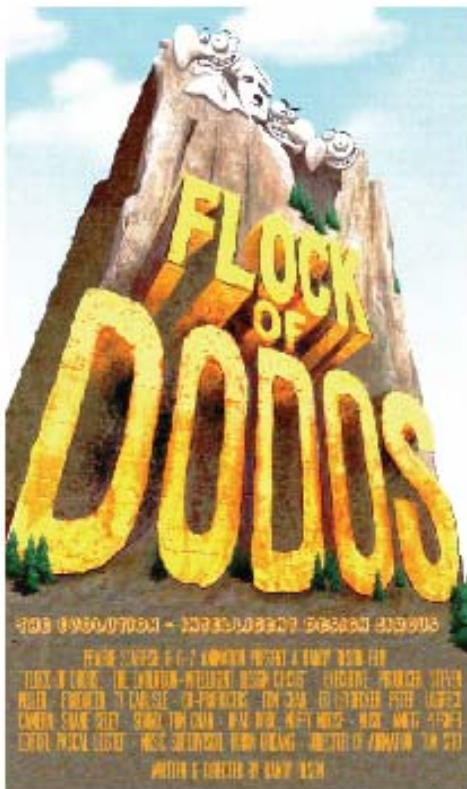

FEMICIDE IN THE AMERICAS GUATEMALA: A CASE STUDY

The event will include a presentation by Lucia Muñoz, Executive Director, Mujeres Iniciando en las Américas (MIA), and a screening of Giselle Portenier's critically acclaimed documentary, *Killer's Paradise*. Since 1999, more than 4,000 women have been murdered in Guatemala, with numbers escalating every year, yet lawmakers and government officials turn a blind eye. Powerful and uncompromising, *Killer's Paradise* uncovers an emotionally wrenching human rights tragedy, while exposing an inept judicial system that allows it to happen. After almost four decades of civil war, Guatemala is a troubled society, but it can also be seen as a microcosm of the pervasive violence and injustice against women worldwide.
