Six units of college credit are available and scholarships are being offered on a competitive basis. More than \$30,000 in scholarships were awarded for last year's participants, helping defer the cost of living and tuition expenses.

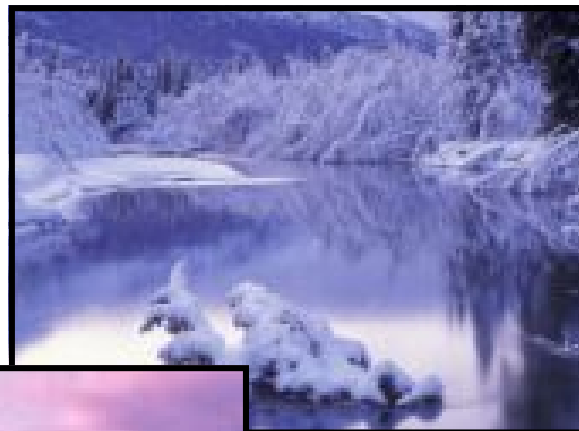

Learn about Alaska at the Kurt Fredriksson Lecture: “Protecting Alaska’s Environment – A Regulator’s View”

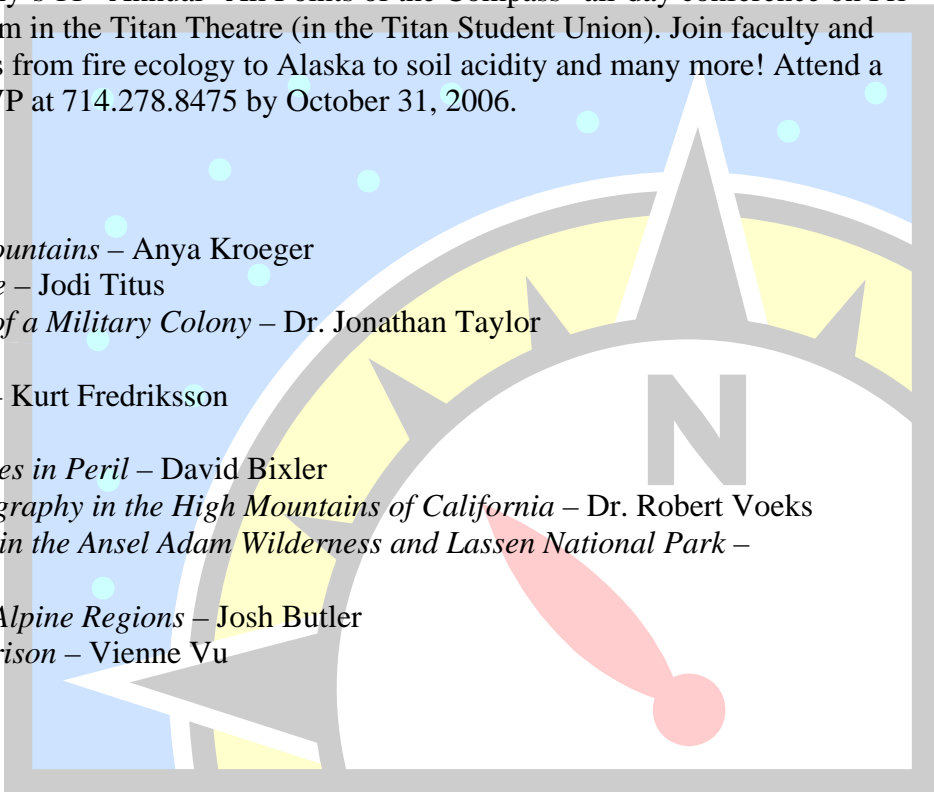

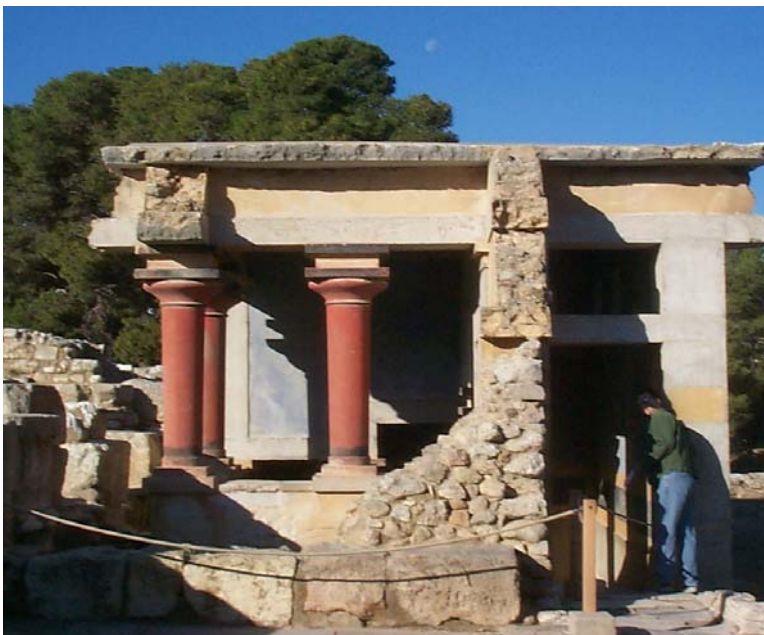
