## *Salt of the Earth*

Thursday March 13, 2008 @ 7pm in the CRC

*Salt of the Earth* is the only film to have ever been Blacklisted in American History. The film is set in a early 1950s fictional village of Zinc Town, New Mexico. The drama tells the story of a long and difficult strike led by Mexican-American and Anglo miners against the Empire Zinc Company. The film shows how the miners (the union men and their wives), the company, and the police, react during the strike. It is one of the first films to advance a critical Feminist social and political perspective with important gender role issues raised throughout the film.

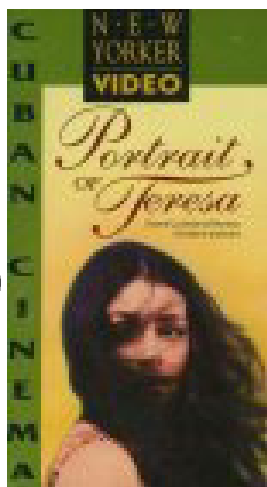


## *Portrait of Teresa*

*Portrait of Teresa* depicts the stubborn survival of the deeply ingrained traditions of machismo and sexism in post-revolutionary Cuban society. Teresa, a housewife and a crew leader at a textile factory, incurs the displeasure and disappointment of her traditionally-minded husband because of her involvement in political and cultural groups. This complex film deals with issues of gender roles, sexism, machismo, and gives an interesting portrayal of 1970s Cuban society.
