Robert Audi earned his B.A. from Colgate University, graduating magna cum laude in philosophy and English. He earned his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He taught briefly at the University of Texas at Austin, and for many years as the Charles J. Mach University Professor of Philosophy at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln before moving to Notre Dame. His teaching includes the areas of business ethics, epistemology and philosophy.

Audi is the author of numerous papers and books, including the recently published, *Business Ethics and Ethical Business*. He has served as general editor of the First Edition (1995) and Second Edition (1999) of *The Cambridge Dictionary of Philosophy* and as Editor of *The Journal of Philosophical Research*. His major work has focused on ethics—where he is widely known for his intuitionist theory of obligation and value—on epistemology, and on the theory of action.
