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Introduction

The inspiration to start this project happened because of the Asian American Studies Civic Engagement class (ASAM 230) I took at Cal State Fullerton. The course was taught by Dr. Jennifer A. Yee and was taken during my spring semester of 2016. Through the course, I learned about community based organizations (CBOs) and was able to develop a passion for civic engagement and activism as a result of it. However, after I took the course, I found that students who wanted to continue volunteering were having a difficult time finding and connecting with other CBOs in the area.

To help these students, I created this archive consisting of 20 CBOs in Los Angeles and Orange County. In order to give students a wide range of selection, I intentionally chose ten CBOs for each of the counties. These organizations were established to provide support and resources to the Asian American and Pacific Islander community. Services range from youth programs to affordable housing developments, these organizations help sustain the people and the community that they live in.

Although this document contains a wide range of organizations, I did not include all of the AAPI serving CBOs in Los Angeles and Orange County below. The

The CBOs listed below include the following information:

- **Mission Statement:** a statement about the organizations' vision
- **Location:** is not the service site, but it is where the organization's headquarter is located at. Some may not have a specific location, so they are listed under their city.
- **Target Population:** the population that the organization is serving
- **Programs /Services:** programs and services that the organizations offer
- **Volunteer Opportunities:** contact information on any volunteering/internship opportunities at the organization
- **Contact Information:** include address, phone number, email, and website, but some who do not have the information mentioned above will be listed with a website URL

Immigration Assistance

Through clinics and individual representation, the organization provides free assistance to AANHPIs who are in detention or have deportation orders. The organization also help undocumented immigrants who are eligible for the President's executive relief program.

Citizenship Assistance

Building on the past successful workshops in Los Angeles County, the organization will increase free assistance to Orange County residents seeking to naturalize.

Healthcare Access

Asian Americans for Advancing Justice will work with community partners to outreach to and enroll low-income undocumented youth into a new state health insurance program, as well as continue to outreach and enroll AAPIs in Covered California and Medi-Cal programs.

Voting rights and Voter Engagement

The organization will continue to support AAPI leaders and community groups in Fullerton and other Orange County cities facing district election challenges.

Asian Pacific AIDS Intervention Team

Mission Statement

Programs/Services

HIV Care Programs

- HIV Testing
APAIT offers free, confidential, and rapid HIV tests with results delivered in less than 20 minutes.
- Partner and Family Notification
APAIT have available counselors that will be able to give options on how to inform partners and family members about health status.
- James Sakakura Family Room
A social support group that meets every Wednesday from 12:00 p.m. to 2 p.m. Come and enjoy a light lunch, and learn how to live well and thrive with HIV/AIDS.
- Linkage to Care
The Linkage to Care Specialists are able to assist in linking individuals living with HIV/AIDS to HIV medical care, by helping individuals overcome barriers that may prevent them from sustaining the medical care and treatment that they need. Our specialists help make accessing care as easy and efficient as possible so that clients can achieve a better quality of life.

- Patient Navigation
The program's patient navigators can provide individuals with consultations and health information, assess eligibility for public health coverage and other benefits programs. The program will also assist with the application process, schedule appointments with providers, obtain translation and interpretation services, help plan next steps, and follow up with pending application statuses and/or upcoming appointments.
- Behavioral Services
Trained and licensed mental health professionals provide short-term or sustained therapeutic interventions if you experience acute and/or ongoing mental health disorders.
- Housing Case Management
The program's housing case managers work through Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) to assist individuals with housing programs such as: Short Term Rent, Mortgage, and Utilities (STRMU), Permanent Housing Placement (PHP), and Section We can also help with referrals for emergency shelters, food pantries, and other community resources.
- INSPIRE
A counseling program that provides one-on-one, weekly sessions to address sexual risk for HIV and sexually transmitted infections (STIs), adherence to HIV medical treatments, societal/cultural stigma, substance abuse avoidance, health care access, and disclosure of status. This program is free and open to both HIV-positive and HIV-negative individuals.
- Medical Retention Services
Providing medical case management services for individuals who are not HIV medication adherent, medically compromised or have a viral load greater than 100,00 copies/mL, and dealing with medical and/or behavioral health co-morbidities that impeded medical care adherence.
- Medical Transportation
The organization can provide free bus tokens if individuals have trouble attending medical appointments.

- Non-Medical Case Management
The organization can provide food pantry, client advocacy, and client support services
- Emergency Financial Assistance Housing
If participants are living with HIV/AIDS and need help with housing, the program can offer emergency rental, deposit, and/or utilities assistance.

Behavioral Health Services

- Mind Body Spirit Wellness
A one-on-one cognitive-behavioral therapy (CBT)-based, short-term or sustained therapy for HIV-positive individuals experiencing acute and/or ongoing co-occurring mental health disorders.
- L.E.T.S (Learn, Educate, Trust, and Support) Talk Support Group
L.E.T.S. talk is a weekly social support group for people living with HIV/AIDS. L.E.T.S. talk promotes wellness and support while providing individuals with the opportunity to talk in a safe and confidential atmosphere.

Open Mic Series

Common Ground follows in the tradition of One Mic, an open mic series that was coordinated by the spoken word group, Mai Piece, and ran from January 2004 to February 2006 throughout Orange County. Following transitions and location challenges, One Mic went on permanent hiatus.

In 2010, there was a statewide gathering of over 50 people who identified as Viet and progressive to learn, share, and explore what it means to build a vision for social justice in the Viet community. This gathering sparked renewed interest in recreating an open mic series in the region. And this seemed like an opportune moment coinciding with VAALA's Cultural Center opening in Santa Ana the previous year. Shortly after the gathering, local activists, artists, and organizers met to discuss and develop what would be known as common ground, which kicked off its inaugural show at the VAALA Cultural Center in August of 2010.

Civic Engagement Program

Korean Resource Center pursues an integrated civic engagement program by bringing its holistic model of organizing, which combines services, education, culture, organizing and advocacy, into civic engagement. Korean Resource Center trains and involves its staffs, board of members in its organizing work that encompasses both electoral and non-electoral cycles, including voter engagement, legislative visits to congress members on immigration reform, town halls, public testimony at hearings, rallies assisting community members through social services, and educational workshops.

Immigrant Rights

- Immigration Legal Services:
Provide legal services on naturalization, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), Deferred Action for Parental of Americans and Lawful Permanent Residents (DAPA)

- Immigration Rights Education:
Provide information on in-state tuition for undocumented students (AB 540), California Dream Act, and driver's licenses for immigrants. It also hosts College Access Series and Youth Power Academy

Health Access Program

Korean Resource Center provides low-income families, seniors and children with free consultation on accessing to federal or state government sponsored health care programs which include Healthy Families, Healthy Kids, and Medi-Cal for applying for several services sponsored by County of Los Angeles.

Education

Korean Resource Center provides education in the community by holding on-going community education forums that address the social and political issues that impact Korean Americans. Moreover, KRC partners with the National Korean American Service and Education Consortium (NAKASEC) to publish educational materials on critical issues such as hate crimes, census 2000, and immigrant-related legislation & policies.

Past programs include:

- KRC's Saturday Roots Program
Offered young grade school students the opportunity to learn about their Korean cultural heritage and develop their English language skills since 1988. Tailored for the youth of Koreatown, this program sought to strengthen their sense of identity as Korean Americans.
- The Summer Youth Empowerment Project
Helped young Korean Americans gain a better understanding of the Korean American communities and other social and economic issues that affect the community. KRC also provided a library with over 3,500 books, magazines, and audio-visuals materials available to the public.

OCAPICA's health programs aim to support low income families through patient navigation, health education, and access to health care systems and insurance. Topics include cancer, cardiovascular, diabetes, chemicals, ergonomics safety in the workplace, and other chronic diseases

Mental Health

- Outreach and Engagement
Outreach and Engagement helps individuals and families with mental health needs by linking them to appropriate services. Outreach and Engagement also helps to dispel the myths and stigma some community members associate with mental illness
- Well(ness)essity
Well(ness)essity is funded under the Mental Health Services Act, Proposition 63. Prevention and Early Intervention-Outreach and Engagement is dedicated to developing and carrying out culturally competent and creative activities that best serve the diverse communities of Orange County. This program focuses on motivating participants and promoting increase in knowledge and skills about mental health wellness

- Project Focus/For Our Children's Ultimate Success
Project FOCUS is a full service partnership/wraparound program, which provides case management, counseling, and supportive resources for children and their families. The goal of Project FOCUS is to do "whatever it takes" to support a young person in their recovery and to ensure they stay in their homes and communities. Our members are involved in every step of their care plan and work in partnership with the program and resources to set recovery goals based upon their strengths, needs and desire.

Policy

OCAPICA's goal is to increase under-served and underrepresented communities' voices and participation in civic engagement and public policy. The Policy & Advocacy program focuses on various issues, such as: addressing disparities in health, education and community and economic development.

Youth Education

- Allied Health Academy
The High School Allied Health Academy (AHA) aims to support and guide Latinos, Pacific Islanders, Southeast Asians, and other underserved students in high schools throughout Anaheim Union School District towards a career in allied health and other health professions.
- Healthy Asian Pacific Islander Youth Empowerment Program (HAPI-YEP)
HAPI-YEP aims to address health concerns and improve higher educational access for Asian and Pacific Islander and other students at Magnolia High School. This program is ending in the Fall of 2017.
- OCAPICA FAFSA Completion
This program works with school throughout the Anaheim Union High School District to increase FAFSA completion rates for the graduating senior class.
- OCAPICA Scholars
The OCAPICA Scholars program aims to increase the number of underserved Asian American, Pacific Islander and other under-served high school students who gain access to higher education opportunities by providing scholarship support.

Workforce

- Youth Employment

OCAPICA provides employment and training services for Orange County youth ages 17-24 that have barriers to employment. These programs provide family-centered, culturally and linguistically competent services. Workshops are available to help participants develop their education plan and career interests, become goal oriented, and gain special skills to prepare them for their futures. It also includes programs like, the Employment Preparation Program (EPP), Work Experience (WEX), Vocational Training (VTR).

Mentorship

A mentor provides each mentee with guidance and support. This relationship is an integral aspect of the Mentee's development in the program. Mentors and mentees maintain contact at least once a week in addition to Study Hall and monthly activities.

Summer Camp

The annual camp helps develop bonds among members of the Project MotiVATe family, fosters a positive and supportive environment and establishes relationships for the upcoming school year. Activities consists of team building, leadership workshops, academic and career planning sessions, and cultural awareness activities.

Study Hall

Project MotiVATe offers weekly study hall sessions where academic tutors work with mentees to improve academic skills and study habits. At study hall, mentees also receive academic counseling, college preparation assistance, and participate in workshops.

Monthly Activities

Monthly activities are designed to expose youth to enriching experiences and promote civic engagement, such as college and career fairs, museum trips, and community and cultural events

Mission Statement

Health

- Health Changes
Health Changes Program provides outreach, screening, education, referrals, and follow up of medical services to reduce health disparities for our local Cambodian and Latino population in 3 focus areas: diabetes, heart disease and stroke
- Trauma Resolution and Stress Reduction
The "Opportunities for Change" project help participants learn the causes of stress, pain, trauma, and dysfunctional habits
- Minnie Street Family Resource Center
By partnering up with local agencies in a County-funded program to provides critical mental health services to Hispanic and Cambodian community. In the past two years, the agency provided health accessing and family counseling to more than 200 Cambodians parents in the community
- The Walking Club
The Walking Club is an important new addition to the Health Program. Participants are mostly Cambodian refugee women, over 45 years of age. Participants are given a walker that monitors their blood pressure before and after the walk using a Blood Pressure Monitor. The Walking Club is an

important step in encouraging local residents to develop good habits that will improve their health

After School Youth Program

- Plan Ahead Program

Supports the healthy development of approximately 75 Cambodian and Latino youths, ages 6-20, who participate year round in our after school and weekend activities. The Youth Program promotes academic achievement, character development, and career exploration. About 50 parents who participate in parenting education, counseling, and referral services.

The Cambodian Family is working with local organizations in Santa Ana to help build a healthier community. Part of the work is the engagement of community residents in leadership development.

Over the past 30 years, the organizations have helped hundreds of refugees and immigrants pass their naturalization tests. The organization has also been holding free Naturalization Workshops.

- Leadership Development

Through the Orange County Cambodian American Network, The Cambodian Family is promoting social equity within the Cambodian-American Community of Orange County, California by bringing together

community leaders, professionals, and students to network, support, and empower one another.

- College Student Support

The Cambodian Family has worked with several local college student organizations. The collaboration has proven to be mutually beneficial, allowing the organization to connect with students in the youth program transition to college via tutoring and college campus tours.

The Festival includes an Art Contest for over 300 children, an Awards Ceremony featuring cultural performances, and an Art Exhibition of all the children's artwork.

Viet Film Fest

VAALA is proud to be a central platform for the voices of Vietnamese filmmakers and stories about the Vietnamese people. Viet Film Fest welcomes the community support in collaborative projects to use cinema as a tool for spotlighting the diverse voices in the community.

sSMART Program

The sSMART Program offers FREE, year-round art workshops in a variety of areas for organizations in the Los Angeles and Orange County areas serving underserved youth from all backgrounds. The objectives of the sSMART Program are to:

- Enhance creativity and self-expression
- Build confidence and self-esteem
- Develop a sense of community-orientation
- Familiarize youth to multiple art forms
- Develop a sense of art appreciation
- Expose youth to different interests/hobbies and career options
- Create opportunities for artists to serve diverse communities

Invited artist instructors conduct workshops in areas which include but are not limited to filmmaking, Claymation, painting, animation, drawing, arts and crafts, photography (film and digital), T-shirt making, poetry and spoken-word. Participating groups need to be a non-profit, Los Angeles or Orange County-based organization that serve children experiencing educational, socioeconomic, and/or physical needs. Participants' ages range from 6 years to 18 years. Workshop capacity ranges from 10-25 people. Workshops last from two to eight hours per session and may be carried out in one or multiple sessions.

- Photography Workshop
In October 2014, VAALA held a sMART workshop with the students from HAPI-YEP at Magnolia High School and photographer Hung Pham. Hung shared about the ABC's of Photography, levitation and photography. The students put concepts into practice with their own action shots! - Youth in Motion: A Workshop for Emerging Filmmakers
Piloted in 2014 as part of its sMART program series and in conjunction with its annual Viet Film Fest, Youth in Motion: A Workshop for Emerging Filmmakers is offered by VAALA to support young voices, stories, and perspectives in the Vietnamese community through the art of digital films. Workshop participants will explore and learn basic skills and tools for digital filmmaking and work collaboratively to produce short films that premiere at the annual Viet Film Fest. Participants have the opportunity to learn about the production process - from storytelling to camera work to editing - and put their skills to practice. Sessions include guest speakers from the local film community

On a typical day, up to 100 seniors come here to participate in many of the program's activities, which include a delicious and nutritious Vietnamese hot meal, social activities, and workshops. Also include free physical activity classes for seniors on a daily basis.

ESL, Citizenship, and Computer Classes

Since their introduction to VNCOOC's curriculum, the English as a Second Language (ESL), Citizenship, and the Computer Fundamental classes have enjoyed a high level of attendance. The classes have provided the recently-migrated residents a means to cope with the new environment and a vehicle to go forward on their new lives' journey.

The Senior Non-Emergency Medical Transportation program was developed to provide older adults access to non-emergency medical appointments with a lowest possible transportation fees. Immediately after getting started in 2002, the program has had the participation of thousands of seniors and has been serving on an average of 12,000 trips per year.

- SMP

The Senior Mobility Program was developed to provide transportations for seniors to visit the Senior Center.

Champion Alliance Program

Train participants on nutrition, physical activity and health beverages.

REACH Program

VNCOC is part of the REACH program to provide resources for chronic illness prevention and management within the Vietnamese American community in Orange County.

Citizenship and Immigration Program

Within the past 10 years, VNCOC has helped more than 10,000 Vietnamese refugees and immigrants to become naturalized American citizens by providing them free citizenship training classes and guiding them through the application process.

VNCOC also assists Vietnamese-American citizens in filling out immigration forms or making petition for relatives. The organization also provide translated materials and friendly bilingual service to make the process less daunting.

Food Commodities

Every second Friday of each month, VNCOC provides free canned food, juices, milk, meat, rice, and vegetables, etc. to low-income residents.

Legal Services

- Telephone Billing Assistance Program

Since telephone bills can be overwhelming for both English-speaking and non-English-speaking consumers in the community, the Program is designed to guide the consumers through the matrix of telephone bills.

The purpose is to remove non-essential, un-necessary, yet expensive

options from the consumer's telephone account, thus will help to lower the overall monthly telephone expense.

- CHANGES Program

The program provides services to Limited English Proficiency and underserved communities through outreach, consumer education workshops, and dispute resolution services involving gas and electricity utilities.

- Mental Health Services - Full Service Partnership (FSP)

FSP has a "Whatever-It-Takes" approach toward promoting success for youth. Emphasis is put on servicing youth (up to their 26th birthday) who are severely mentally ill or have serious emotional disorders/disturbance. Assistance is provided with medical, educational, social, prevocational, vocational, rehabilitative and other community services. VNOC also provide referrals for housing, nutrition, child care, transportation, employment, health care and counseling.

- Early Intervention Services For Older Adults (EISOA):

A socialization program which provides isolated older adults in Orange County with the opportunity to reintegrate into the community and improve their quality of life.

Advancing Justice - LA collaborates with community-based groups to hold free citizenship workshops and also takes a limited number of citizenship cases at low or no cost
- Immigration
California is home to more immigrants than any other state. The Immigration Project at Advancing Justice-Los Angeles assists immigrants nationally and locally who are seeking help with immigration relief such as adjustment of status, representation in immigration court, and other forms of family-based immigration. The Immigration Project hosts free in-house and off-site

In 2009, Asian Americans Advancing Justice - Los Angeles (Advancing Justice - LA), then called Asian Pacific American Legal Center of Southern California (APALC), and the UCLA Asian American Studies Center jointly edited and published *Untold Civil Rights Stories*, the first national guide of its kind for students, teachers, and communities. This guide was a unique educational partnership between one of the nation's foremost advocates of civil rights and social justice for Asian Americans and others, Advancing Justice - LA, and the nation's leading research center and department on Asian Americans, the UCLA Asian American Studies Center (UCLA AASC)

- Youth and Parent Leadership Development
The Youth & Parent Leadership Development unit develops the leadership skills of immigrant families. Advancing Justice - LA works with racially diverse youth in Los Angeles and the San Gabriel Valley through the school-based LDIR program, an in-school class for high school students, as well as through after-school programs. Advancing Justice - LA also provides multilingual parent training programs for Asian and Latino immigrants, to help them advocate for their children and their community.
- Leadership Development in Intergroup Relations
Leadership Development in Intergroup Relations (LDIR) is a program that works to empower, mobilize and equip multiethnic, multicultural and multi-identity individuals, communities, schools and organizations with awareness, skills and the action steps necessary to foster positive and sustainable intergroup relations for social change.

Policy and Research

- Health Justice
The Health Access Project addresses the health-related needs of Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (NHPI) communities and immigrants. Advancing Justice - LA advocates with policy makers on health care reform implementation and works with community partners to educate Asian American and NHPI community members and small businesses. Advancing Justice - LA also works on other related issues, such as public benefits access and cultural and linguistic barriers to services.

Advancing Justice - LA has successfully litigated numerous cases on behalf of low wage workers from a wide range of communities based on our innovative model of litigating for social change, which incorporates clients in decision-making and strategizing and has been instrumental to empowering workers and imposing accountability in key industries like the garment industry.
- Race and National Origin Discrimination
Advancing Justice - LA has successfully litigated cases challenging English-only policies by cities and employers (e.g., Monterey Park, CA, hospitals, casinos), as well as racially discriminatory employment practices and education policies (e.g., Abercrombie & Fitch, University of California, Berkeley).

Targeting senior-level Asian and Pacific Islander managers who are in the position to attain higher levels of management, this program works to specifically hone the skills associated with executive leadership while incorporating a focus on the relevant influences of their Asian cultural heritage and values. This 2.5-day program explores and prepares API's for the challenges that their companies face in the wake of continued growth and profitability.

The program features extensive 360-feedback from management, peers and direct reports with opportunities to practice and enhance proficiency through work-based role plays, large-scale simulations and case study analysis. All aspects of the program are focused on strengthening the participant's leadership competencies and skills.

- Leadership Development Program for Higher Education

The Leadership Development Program in Higher Education (LDPHE) is an intensive 4-day experience designed to enhance the professional development of Asian and Pacific Islanders (APIs) working in higher education and to prepare college and university administrators, faculty, and staff to move into leadership positions of greater visibility and influence on their campuses.

Created in 1997 and conducted by Leadership Education for Asian Pacifics, Inc. (LEAP) in partnership with Asian Pacific Americans in Higher Education (APAHE), the LDPHE is the only program in the United States that focuses on leadership training from an API perspective while offering personal coaching and the invaluable insights of successful API leaders in higher education.

- Leadership in Action

Leadership in Action (LIA) is an eight-week, paid summer internship program that develops the next generation of college student leaders. LIA builds an intentional leadership and hands-on work experience around three themes:

- Thinking - Leadership Development Trainings
- Doing - Community-Based Organization Internship
- Making - Team Community Impact Project

- Career and Leadership Seminars

The seminars feature diverse speakers who discuss and share the choices and decisions that led to their current careers, the opportunities for leadership in their professions and industries and the importance of diverse leadership that is inclusive of APIs. LEAP partners with student organizations at various colleges and universities to create events that best suits the interests of the API student body at each institution. These events vary in length and have included panels, leadership workshops, and networking opportunities. These seminars encourage students to be involved on their campuses and bring the leadership skills they develop into their careers and workplaces.

Tuesday Night Cafe is our flagship free public arts and performance series. Launched in 1999, TNC has since become one of the longest-running free arts series in Downtown LA and is the oldest still-running Asian American mic series in the country.

Tuesday Night Cafe maintains a passionate, positive space with a focus on bridging art+community through new original work from Asian American/Pacific Islander communities and the greater Los Angeles area. The series runs on the 1st & 3rd Tuesday of each month, April through October, and features a curated program of multidisciplinary visual and performing art as well as an open mic section.

Tuesday Night Cafe is presented in the Aratani Courtyard of the Union Center for the Arts in Little Tokyo, Downtown Los Angeles through the support of their fiscal receiver, Little Tokyo Service Center. The space has served as a cultural/community

entry point to Little Tokyo for thousands of people since its beginnings. Average audiences at TNC have grown to 100-250 people at each event, with people spilling onto the sidewalk and adjacent parking lot.

Now a destination for many Asian American performers across the nation, Tuesday Night Cafe has been recognized by USA Today's 10Best as the best Los Angeles Open Mic and by LA Weekly as the Best Free Downtown Performance Series Los Angeles 2013 and one of Ten Great L.A. Open Mic Nights for Music!

Established in 2002, the Armed with Camera Fellowship for Emerging Media Artists recruits, trains, and supports independent AAPI artists in their efforts to create artistically and culturally significant short films. Through a five-month program, the AWC Fellowship offers training, mentorship, and funding to up-and-coming artists to create new work that premieres at the annual Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival.

Digital Histories

The Digital Histories video production and digital storytelling program for senior citizens is designed for older generations to create and preserve visual stories to be passed down to younger generations. Their works consist of personal and place-based documentaries and other compelling narratives that contribute to the artistic expression and healthy lifestyles of older adults. These films will premiere at the annual Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival.

The Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival

The annual Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival (LAAPFF) showcases important new work by established filmmakers, and supports local, emerging Los Angeles talent. The Festival takes place annually during the month of April as part a kickoff to Asian Pacific Heritage Month. The Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival has an annual audience of over 25,000 individuals in attendance at its screenings,

educational seminars and artist talks, and other special events. The Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival is also an Academy Award®-qualifying festival for Short Film Awards. Recipient(s) of the Film Festival's Golden Reel Award for Narrative Short Film will be eligible for consideration in the Animated Short Film/Live-Action Short Film category of the Academy Awards®.

C3: The Conference for Creative Content

The Conference for Creative Content is a two-day media arts conference focused to provide our creative community a space for meaningful discourse on media and entertainment. With panel and seminar topics covering new media technologies, media platforms, distribution, C3 celebrates creativity and diversity through a forum with established pioneers in entertainment, academia, and professional guilds. Within this intimate space, it our goal to connect our aspiring and emerging content creators with creative individuals leading the charge.

VC Archives

The VC Archives serves as an integral part of our documentary-based production activities as we have documented various Asian American social movements and communities in California. Additionally, preserved films and videos were used for education and organizing work around setting up ethnic studies programs on local campuses, city redevelopment issues, the redress campaign for Japanese Americans interned during World War II, and the declaration of martial law in the Philippines. VC's own past in media, narrative films, documentaries and educational projects are intertwined with the Asian Pacific American movements of the 1970s, and in itself represents a rich resource of the APA movements for students, researchers, and filmmakers. To date, VC materials have been used in numerous films, videos, educational materials, publications, and major photographic exhibits across the United States
